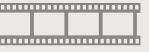




Dear Diary,

This interview of Ekta ma'am (the degree college P.T teacher) for 'Global victory' took place on the 29th Of August by Richelle Aranjo and Tejaswini Rajput.

- Q. According to you, how important was the strategy during the World Cup T20 games?
- "In any game, the strategy is very important, without the strategy there is no game. For example, during the T20 World Cup, India knew what they were doing especially during the finals. They were aware of the strengths and weaknesses of their players as well as the opponent's and they used this to their advantage. They knew at what speed (of the ball) the opponent batsman should give a dot ball. These strategies can be made only through practice. From practicing the strengths and weaknesses of a player are seen."
- Q. How important is the role of a captain and how was it reflected during the T20 World Cup Finals?
- "A captain is very important in any game. A captain has to provide the right guidance to the players and has to have the ability to coordinate, compassion is an important quality of a captain. The captain should know when to scold the teammate and when to explain gently.
- Decision-making is also very necessary, if the captain makes a wrong decision the team loses the game because the team members believe they need and should follow the decision made by the captain.
- Due to this the blame entirely falls on the captain and he is alone. The captain should not make any decisions in haste, he/she must not be aggressive instead the captain should be a cool-minded person who would be good for others.



According to me, Rohit Sharma the Indian Cricket team captain possesses all these qualities. Under his leadership, India had reached the semi-finals in the previous T20 World Cup, though we lost we still made it through the quarter-finals and made it to the semi which is a very big deal. If he wasn't aware of his team's strength or weakness he wouldn't know what kind of decision to me. He possesses great decision-making skills, you could see that during the game, according to the opponent batsman, he would change the positioning of the fielders, and guide them as to how they need to tackle his batsman.

- Rohit Sharma was a Great Indian Team Captain. "
- Q) How important is winning or losing in a game?. Does a player learn more from winning or losing?
- -"Winning or losing takes place in every game. You can't be a winner in every game. In some games you will win, some you will lose but your performance in every game is more important. Sometimes players perform extremely well but they still lose, that depends on the luck factor.
- A player must keep his/her performance in check. If a team is going to lose, why would they participate in the first place? 12 teams qualified for the T20 World Cup, they knew the tournament could be won by only 1 team yet they all participated. If the teams were in the mindset that only one team could win the tournament and they could lose they wouldn't have participated. They know they need to play to improve their performance and carry on.

- Like what India did, they lost the previous semi-finals but they continued to improve their performance and they won this T20 World Cup.
- -No one is accurate but that shouldn't stop a player from continuing to play the sport. Till you don't play how will you know if you have improved or not?

Winning or losing doesn't matter, A player's performance matters more. "

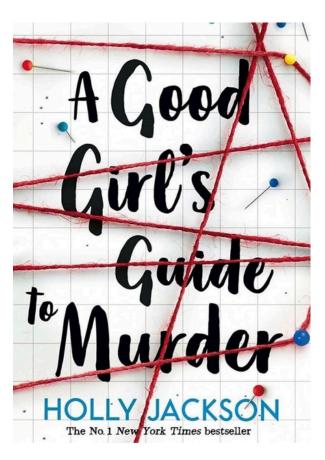
